D'VAR HA RAV: RABBI'S MESSAGE

Todah Rabbah

Jon and I would like to extend an enthusiastic *todah rabbah* — many thanks — for the warm welcome we have received since joining the Temple B'nai Tikvah community on July 1st. Everyone we've met so far has been very gracious and supportive. We look forward to getting to know the rest of you at one of the fall gatherings and as we share Temple life together in the coming months.

A few weeks ago, at *Erev Shabbat* services, I spoke about our synagogue as a "city of refuge" which can provide us with a place to feel protected, to heal, and to be transformed. Please know that my door is always open if you'd like to talk about any matters of the head, heart, or soul. I look forward to hearing from you.

The Month of Elul: A Prelude to the High Holy Days

I am always amazed by Judaism's infinite wisdom and often astute awareness of the human condition. Take the High Holy Days, for example. This is a time of deep reflection, repentance, and reconciliation. We are supposed to assess our shortcomings **and** our triumphs, and, where necessary, to repair our relationships with G-d, family, friends, the community, and ourselves. We do this through a combination of confession, apology, forgiveness, and a commitment to change our behaviour.

There is a great deal of courtroom and trial imagery in the High Holy Day liturgy — we try to soften G-d's judgment and decree with *tefila* (prayer), *teshuvah* (repentance) and *tzedakah* (charity/righteousness). We can seek forgiveness or leniency from G-d...but only for our transgressions against G-d. For our transgressions against our fellow human beings, we must seek forgiveness directly from them.

When you think about it, the 10 days we have between *Rosh Hashanah* and *Yom Kippur* are not enough time to do this hard work if we are to take our task seriously. With this in mind, the sages set aside the entire month before *Rosh HaShanah* — the month of *Elul* — to begin our work. This year, the month of *Elul* corresponds to August 16 - September 13 on the secular calendar.

There are many ways to use the month of *Elul* to help prepare for the High Holy Days. I offer you a few ideas:

- Change your Jewish calendar—or put one up for the first time—to be more fully aware of the opportunity for change.
- Sign up for *Jewels of Elul* (www.JewelsofElul.com) and receive short daily emails from Craig Taubman which contain inspirational insights from an eclectic group of people.

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- Take the entire month of *Elul* to identify, reflect, and act upon those things in your life that need fixing or repair. Try setting a different goal for each of the four weeks. Ask yourself: "What progress am I making?" "What obstacles am I encountering?" "What can I do to overcome these obstacles?" Keep a journal, if that helps.
- Begin the sometimes difficult process of granting and asking for forgiveness.
- Blow a shofar — or hear a shofar blown — every morning (except Shabbat) until the day before *Rosh Hashanah*. The blasts of the shofar are intended to awaken our spirits and inspire us to begin our soul searching. (Anyone who lives in the Stanley Park neighborhood should be able to hear me blow the shofar about 8:00 in the morning.)
- Read *Psalm 27* daily. It begins with these words: G-d is my light and my help, whom should I fear; G-d is the stronghold of my life, whom should I dread? And despite the Psalmist's confidence and trust in G-d, the Psalm also asks G-d not to be hidden from us: Hear O G-d, when I cry aloud; Have mercy on me, answer me.
- Attend our *S'lichot* program and service which begins at 7:00pm on Saturday, September 5th. This is a special time to come together to offer our prayers for forgiveness, to hear the ancient and haunting melodies of the High Holy Days, and to recite the 13 Divine Attributes, which call upon G-d's mercy and compassion.

If you take me up on my invitation to do any of these things, I think you'll find that this year's High Holy Days will be even more meaningful for you than in past years.

RIDING FOR A CAUSE

On July 8th and 9th, Temple B'nai Tikvah hosted a team of 22 riders who were cycling from Austin Texas to Anchorage Alaska — a total of over 7,000 kilometres! 

S'LICHOT SERVICES

S'lichot are special prayers which ask for forgiveness. It has become customary to gather together on the Saturday night before *Rosh Hashanah* for an all-night service—in a sense, a warm-up to the High Holy Days. We will gather at 7 pm on September 5, 2015. Our evening begins with dessert, followed by study, *Havdalah*, the changing of the Torah mantles, and then the service with its soulful melodies.

New: Our study session this year will be *Writing on the Wall – An Interactive T'shuvah Experience*.

TASHLICH SERVICES / PICNIC

Tashlich, a brief, yet beautiful ceremony held beside a river or stream, will take place at Stanley Park (4A St. & 42 Ave. SW). On *Rosh Hashanah* afternoon at 4:30 pm we will meet near the west parking lot at the river in Stanley Park to prepare for Yom Kippur by symbolically casting our sins into the “depths of the waters.” We invite you to bring a picnic, and join Rabbi Teri and Jon for a festive meal afterwards.

CONFESSIONS FOR OUR TIME

A special spiritual *Yom Kippur* service. Congregants will lead us through this beautiful hour-long service on Yom Kippur afternoon.

YIZKOR (MEMORIAL) SERVICES

As part of the afternoon service on *Yom Kippur*, we hold a beautiful memorial service. This year, we will remember our own dear ones during a designated moment of silence and will inscribe their names in a *Yom Kippur* Memorial Booklet which will be distributed to the congregation. The *Yizkor* Service begins at 5:30 pm. To create our *Yizkor* list, we use the information from our member database.

CHILDREN'S PROGRAM

On the first day of *Rosh Hashanah* and *Yom Kippur* mornings, there will be an educational program downstairs in the classroom facilities from 10:00 am - 1:00 pm. Children from three years to grade four are welcome. There is no charge for the program and pre-registration is not required.

SPECIAL SERVICES THIS YEAR

Shabbat Shuvah Healing Service

The *Shabbat* between *Rosh Hashanah* and *Yom Kippur* is known as *Shabbat Shuvah* — the Sabbath of Turning — referring to the fundamental theme of the High Holy Days: our turning — or returning. We turn away from transgression; we turn back to G-d, to Torah, to one another, to the best of our true selves. This year, we will be offering a special healing service on Friday, September 18th at 8:00 pm. Through special rituals, music, and readings, our service is intended to provide you with hope for a return to wholeness.

Kever Avot Service

The words *kever avot* literally mean the “graves of our fathers.” It is traditional to visit the graves of our loved ones between *Rosh Hashanah* and *Yom Kippur*, in the hope that our loved ones will intercede on our behalf with G-d during this time of judgment, and to allow us to honour those who so deeply affected our lives. Rabbi Appleby will be conducting *Kever Avot* services on Sunday, September 20 at two locations:

- 10:00 am – Erlton Jewish Cemetery (32 -30 Ave SW)
- Noon – *Chevra Kadisha* Cemetery (Highway 22X and 37th St SW)
